# THE READING: Luke 21:25-36 (The Message)

Here are some of Jesus' teachings in the temple before the events leading to His death. Jesus speaks of what will happen before the coming of the Son of Man, referring to himself. His advice to His hearers is to be watchful for these signs, but to do so with hope because their redemption is coming.

<sup>5-26</sup> "It will seem like all hell has broken loose—sun, moon, stars, earth, sea, in an uproar and everyone all over the world in a panic, the wind knocked out of them by the threat of doom, the powers-that-be quaking.

<sup>27-28</sup> "And then—then!—they'll see the Son of Man welcomed in grand style—a glorious welcome! When all this starts to happen, up on your feet. Stand tall with your heads high. Help is on the way!"

<sup>29-33</sup> He told them a story. "Look at a fig tree. Any tree for that matter. When the leaves begin to show, one look tells you that summer is right around the corner. The same here—when you see these things happen, you know God's kingdom is about here. Don't brush this off: I'm not just saying this for some future generation, but for this one, too—these things will happen. Sky and earth will wear out; my words won't wear out.

<sup>34-36</sup> "But be on your guard. Don't let the sharp edge of your expectation get dulled by parties and drinking and shopping. Otherwise, that Day is going to take you by complete surprise, spring on you suddenly like a trap, for it's going to come on

everyone, everywhere, at once. So, whatever you do, don't fall asleep at the wheel. Pray constantly that you will have the strength and wits to make it through everything that's coming and end up on your feet before the Son of Man."

## THE GOSPEL: Mark 13:32-37

As the first season of the church year, Advent, has several focuses. One is endings and beginnings which is suggested in this New Testament reading. This portion, of Mark's story about Jesus' life, is sometimes called the "Little Apocalypse". Here Jesus is speaking not just about the end of life, but of all human history, and that they are to keep awake to experience what will then come.

'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert;\* for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

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
