

More and more, as I think about and study the Bible, I look behind it and think about how and why the stories are told. Biblical stories are not written merely to chronicle historical facts. There are certainly a lot of facts in the Bible. Biblical scholars and other people of faith can debate the historical accuracy of biblical stories, but the stories themselves are not told simply to record what happened when. The facts are not the main thing. Instead, the Biblical stories were told, and written down, to teach us about God's relationship with us and to lead us deeper and deeper into faith. The details of the stories are meant to assist in that task.

When it comes to Jesus' birth, there are two different stories told in the Bible. The gospel writers Mark and John did not tell us anything about Jesus' birth. For them, the facts of Jesus' parentage and birth were not important, and if we only had their Gospels, we would know nothing about Jesus' birth. The two stories we have, in Matthew and Luke, are very different.

Traditionally, we combine these two stories into one to form our manger scenes and our Christmas programs, throwing shepherds and wise men, angels and stars all into one story. We do this because we have found meaning in each of the details, but in the Bible they are different. Here are some examples:

MATTHEW:

- The wise men (the Magi) who are from outside of the People of Israel. (Mt 2:1-2, 9-12) He is showing us that Jesus' birth is for all people, not just for Israel.
- Gives us the King Herod stories. (Mt 2:3-8) Jesus (and God) does not use power the way earthly kings, like Herod, do. The powers of this world try to destroy Jesus rather than worship him.
- The killing of the children of Bethlehem (Mt 2:16-18) Matthew recognizes the suffering and evil in this world. Jesus is born into the midst of this suffering and grief. Rather than denying these realities, Jesus comes to give hope in the face of them.

LUKE:

- The Journey to Bethlehem (Lk 2:1-4) God can use the seculars powers of this world to bring about God's will.
- The baby laid in the manger (Lk 2:6-7) This foreshadows Jesus' concern for the poor and hungry. Jesus will feed the hungry, and give his body as bread for the world.
- The shepherds (Lk 2:8-18) He is showing us that Jesus' birth brings hope to the common people, the poor of the land.

What other details of these stories do you treasure? Why do you think they are included and what meaning do they have for us? What about the stories about Egypt (Mt 2:13-15, 19-23)? Why does Matthew tell us about this, what does he want us to learn?

The stories of the Bible can be beautiful and challenging, they can be simple enough for children, and difficult enough that we wrestle with them throughout our lives. Through them, God continues to comfort and challenge us, and helps us to grow in our trust in God.

After 75 years of playing—the past 11 at Trinity—Helene Schrankler Retires

Helene started taking piano lessons when she was just 5 years old. Finding ways for Helene and her 2 siblings to have every opportunity available to them, Helene's mother traded eggs from their chickens to cover the cost of the lessons. She would continue those lessons through high school when she was introduced to the organ.

Helene grew up in the Moravian Church (established long before the Reformation) which greatly impacted her life and developing love for the organ. Their emphasis on missionary work convinced her she wanted to follow that path herself. She entered Lakeland College with that ambition in mind while she continued her study of piano and organ. As a student she was presented an opportunity to accompany a local seminary choir. Little did she know how that 'gig' would take her life journey on a path unforeseen.

You see, one particular seminary student who sang in that choir swept Helene right off her feet! Instead of heading off to places unknown for missionary work, and sooner than her parents thought she should have, Helene married Rev. Jerry Schrankler in 1958. Jerry was truly Helene's biggest fan <u>and</u> promoter—always volunteering her to play for various events at numerous places in addition to the churches they served together. Helene also taught individual piano lessons in their home over the years—once having a total of 35 students at the same time!

Serving in the United Church of Christ, Rev. Jerry and Helene's ministry began in Marinette, then spanning to Manitowoc, Columbus, Chilton, Rosendale, Schwartzwald, Elkhart Lake, Black Creek, Ripon and Fond du Lac, before Jerry retired at age 84. At that time they moved to West Bend where he continued to serve as a volunteer pastor at Cedar Community—until his passing in 2023 at the age of 90. Helene has also shared her gifts at Cedar Community, playing the organ and participating in hand bell and chime choirs.

Before landing at Trinity, Helene had played in the Moravian Church, the UCC Church, the Methodist Church and the Episcopal Church. She continued to commute and play in Fond du lac the first summer after their move to West Bend. Then, just about the time the seasons were taking a serious turn and Helene did not look forward to the drive back and forth, one of Trinity's long time organists, Marlene Frey, announced her retirement. With Jerry's encouragement, of course, Helene was happy to find a place to share her gifts so close to home again! She began playing the organ for Trinity in 2014. Not being familiar with the Lutheran worship service at the time, she was relieved to discover that the liturgy was actually very similar. And, to her absolute delight, finding that Trinity had the exact same organ she had been playing in Fond du lac for the previous 18 years was another example, she proclaims, of just how THE HOLY SPIRIT WORKS!

On Tuesday Dec 8th and Monday Dec 15th, members of the BTCC ministry team and volunteers met to pack Christmas bags for all the men at the Felmers Chaney Correctional Center (FCCC) and at the Kenosha Correctional Center (KCC).

Every man incarcerated at FCCC and KCC, regardless of whether or not they join us for worship and bible studies, received a gift bag before Christmas when we were there for our annual Christmas Caroling event. Many of the men receive no other Christmas gifts or even a card.

This year, our gift bags included: body wash, deodorant, beef sticks, peanut butter and crackers, crackers and cheese, protein bars, chips, candy, a Christmas card signed by our ministry team, and two blank cards to share with friends or loved ones. New this year, we were also able to include packets of instant coffee, 2 toothbrushes, and toothpaste due to generous new donors.


SENIOR HIGH FIRST SUNDAY ALL 9TH - 12TH GRADE YOUTH JANUARY 18 | 6-7:30 PM

The confirmation students will lead ALL worship services that weekend (4 PM Saturday / 9:30 AM Sunday). Plan now to keep this weekend free.



The following is from a nationwide survey conducted by JC Penney: "Based on 1-on-1 interviews, there is an increased need for basic necessities - like underwear - especially during the winter months. Yet, these items are often the least requested and least likely to be donated, as few people think to donate these to charity and those in need are often too embarrassed to proactively seek out underwear."

The survey also reported that 55% of children who did not have underwear and socks to wear wanted to skip school or refused to go to school because he or she was embarrassed at not having any. In addition, children may not have "extra" underwear that they can leave at school for "emergency" use.

We have been in touch with the West Bend School District nurses and all schools report a need for new underwear, female and male. For girls, the most needed are girls sizes 4-8, but there is also some need for size 10, 12, 14 as well as women's size medium. The boys could use sizes 4-12, but they are more in need of the smaller sizes.
